Sentences (from the book) to Scramble

Here's a quick and easy way to focus on sentence structure, vocabulary and spelling!

- On a whiteboard, Chalkboard, Smart board or even a piece of paper, write one
 of the following sentences in scrambled fashion. Be sure to Capitalize the first
 letter of the first word and include any punctuation.
- 2. Students write the words in order to make a complete, correct sentence. In order to earn a point, the sentence has to have a Capital letter, spacing, correct spelling and punctuation.
- 3. Once they've completed their sentence, they don't say anything. They just show their sentence. Look at it. If there is one mistake, hold up 1 finger. If there are 2 mistakes, 2 fingers, 3 mistakes, 3 fingers, 4 mistakes, 4 fingers. They continue to correct the sentence.
- 4. If/When there are no mistakes, give a thumbs up and they tally a point.
