

## **CONCRETE POEMS**

Concrete poems form a picture using words. Children enjoy concrete poems because of their outcome and also because they can write ANYTHING. In addition, they don't have to worry about complete sentences or punctuation.







## Here's the lesson!

- 1. First, children choose an image from the samples below. OR, they can draw their own simple image on a clean piece of white paper. They can use a black marker to make wide lines.
- 2. Second, print out the image and place it under a piece of white copy paper.
- 3. Next, the child writes words where the black lines show through. Wherever there is a line, children should write words, phrases or sentences about the image.
- 4. For example, over the fireworks, children might write any or all of the following over the lines:
  - Loud, colorful, huge, bright, July 4<sup>th</sup>, 1776, crowds of people watching, oohs and ahhs, blue, red, white. Fireworks celebrate Independence Day in the United States of America. Families sit on blankets outside. Picnics, music, friends.
- 5. Finally, children can add stickers, use markers to draw or even paint around the concrete poem to add color and charm.

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
